This project is inspired by the migratory journeys of Guatemalans who have left to go north. Some in search of better opportunities, others fleeing persecution. The flow of bodies south-north is recurring throughout history, and is evidenced in during the civil war in the United States. In this case, migrants used secret underground railroads, in which they communicated using a quilt code. Symbols that were sewn together and were left for migrants to see.

 "My war-related works might seem superficial, but they reflect another point of view, sometimes forgotten, of what I see as a collective memory. I grew up to be an adult and found out there was a war around me, which was denied to me in news, school, or casual conversations."
